

On the debit side South has lost Chris Natt who



effort and a much needed goal. From the bounce Willsden influence on the game and it was Ferber who broke the drought with a mark which came over the pack and fell into his arms to goal



Risdon coach Peter Arnold made some position changes at half time that paid dividends in the vital thi


Hadyn Bentley went into ruck, Trevor McDonald centre half forward, David Afford to full forward a Simon Brown to full back.

Ashley Afford got Risdon off to a great start in the fitterm by kicking a goal inside the first minute.




